For younger children

Here is an exercise for children beginning to read. Pick a word or name, for example: Jesus, or for today's theme: sheep, and have your child find and circle that word or name. If you save a copy for them and they know how to underline using the underlining command, they can do it on the computer. Otherwise let them use a printed version of the worship folder. Let them draw and color sheep, lambs and the Shepherd in the margins of the service folder.

5th & 6th graders can mark the service with directional arrows which indicate the direction of the activity during the worship service. This was discussed in class. They can label the different parts of the service. They also are familiar with the questions throughout the service folder.

For older children especially those who are in or have in the past studied Luther's Small Catechism

Here is an exercise that will strengthen their understandings of the teachings of the Bible. Have them mark, underline and/or identify where in the Catechism these teachings are found. For example: Where the resurrection of Jesus Christ is mentioned, one would mark it with the "2nd Article." Or where the forgiveness of sin is mentioned, one would mark it with "3rd Article." They can call me anytime if they have questions.

If any of this can be done from a copy on a computer, they can send it to me attached to an Email.

Adults/parents

You may find this helpful to do the above also, even the drawing and coloring. For the youngest of your children, draw a cross or a lamb, if your talent so allows, anywhere in the Divine Service and let your little ones color them.

As We Gather

The closing prayer of the funeral service begins with these words: "Lord God, our shepherd, You gather the lambs of Your flock into the arms of Your mercy and bring them home." Describing Jesus as a Shepherd is a special image used in prayers, hymns, and Christian artwork. The believer receives a sense of assurance in knowing that the One being followed throughout life is Jesus, the Good Shepherd. The fact that our Lord chooses to repeat the words "I am the Good Shepherd" more than once indicates its importance to Him and to us. As we follow Jesus, we can be confident that He will lead us into that place where goodness and righteousness are eternal.

Sermon Based on 1 Peter 2:19–25

Title:

"Being Shepherded Through Suffering"

Introduction:

I don't know where you are at in the scale of suffering during this coronavirus outbreak. Where do you lie between being inconvenienced or facing actual death? Even the mildest inconvenience is still suffering. And all suffering is a part of this fallen world.

We are experiencing the suffering that comes from disease and epidemics. There is the suffering that comes from war and violence. There is the suffering that comes from hatred and personal attacks from others. There is mental, physical, emotional and spiritual suffering. Suffering comes upon us in many different forms.

Because we are sinful, live in a sinful world and are objects of Satan's hatred, we will experience suffering till our dying day. There will be no end to suffering until Christ's returns. Even then for those who reject Christ, they will experience an unending suffering in Hell. But for those who fear, love and trust in the Good Shepherd, Jesus Christ, they will see an end to all sin, death, sorrow and suffering. Until then, we will need to be shepherded through these present and temporal days of suffering.

I. He gives us an example

One of the ways that Jesus shepherds us through this suffering is He gives us an example. He unjustly bore the wrath of God and punishment of our sins. He did no wrong. He did not sin. He did no evil that would agitate others to strike back.

He preached a message of love and forgiveness. He healed the sick, fed the hungry, made the lame walk, gave sight to the blind and raised loved ones from the dead. He was truly the nicest guy on earth.

Yet, He was treated like the worse of criminals. He was falsely accused of blasphemy. He was paraded through town as a common criminal. He was beaten, spite upon, ridiculed and made to wear a crown of thrones. And the ultimate act of injustice was when He was nailed to the cross.

Even there, He was not given any relief. His Father in heaven forsook Him. The crowds jeered Him. He was mocked and His clothing divided among His executioners.

No person on earth has suffered to the degree Christ suffered on the cross. No person in all of history or in the future will suffer such injustice. He who knew no sin was made sin for us.

Yet, in midst of this horrendous suffering, Jesus did not curse His Father or any of His fellow man. He did not strike back with fists. He spoke the truth and defended Himself in court without blasphemy God. He asked His Father in heaven to forgive those who nailed Him to

the cross. He saw to the needs of His mother while in agony. He spoke words of hope to a thief nailed on a cross to His right. He finished His work without sinning. And in fear, love and trust in His Father, He offered up His soul in death.

This is the example of patience through suffering. This is the way that you and I have been led by the Shepherd to endure suffering. This is the way to handle all types of suffering especially any suffering that comes our way for the sake of Jesus and His gospel.

II. He heals our wounds

Now, when we look at ourselves and then at Jesus' example, we are wounded. While it may be inspirational the way Jesus handled suffering for our sake, it is still commanded of us to handle suffering in the same way Jesus did. We are not to just give it a good try. God commands us to fully handle suffering in the same way as Jesus. We are to be holy just as He was holy for us.

Here is where we are wounded. We have failed to follow the full example of Christ. We become impatient. We become irritable cursing even those who try to help us. We cry unfair, injustice, "I don't deserve this," when we truly do deserve to suffer for our sins. For it is in suffering that we see ourselves as weak creatures returning to the dust.

When we become mindful of God and see Jesus' example, we are wounded. We have sinned. We want to run away like Peter and weep over our failure to live up to what God commands. We are wound and our suffering is now the suffering which comes from a convicted conscience. It is here that our Good Shepherd shepherds us. He heals our wounds.

All that is mentioned above of what Christ endured, all that He went through was for the Father and for us. The unjust suffering of God's wrath was for us so that we would not have to suffer God's eternal wrath. The ridicule, the rejection by people both Jew and Gentile, being forsaken by His Father on the cross was for us. We will not be forsaken by the Father. And we will not suffer the rejection of others for all eternity. We will be reunited with fellow believers never to suffer hateful thought, words and deeds. We will be in a community of people who dearly love God and their neighbor.

Christ uses the forgiveness of the Father to shepherd us through times of suffering. He restores peace in our hearts cleaning our conscience of sin and guilt. He reaffirms that He will not leave our side but will continue to forgive us when we reject or strike back at the love and care He gives through others. He will not be intimidated by our fists and fits of anger. He will forgive and remain at our side leading us through this vale of tears to His mansion in heaven. He will deal and continue to control the evil and unjust suffering the world pours upon us. He will deliver us. It will be so.

Conclusion:

Jesus is our Good Shepherd. He will lead us through the valley of death. He will be at our

side so that we fear no evil. He will provide for us even when our enemies seem the strongest. He will safely get us to His home in heaven.

What we may have to face here on earth no one knows but the Lord. But He gives us confidence. He is our Good Shepherd. And as such, He is the Overseer of our souls. Therefore, we are safe in His presence.
