In preparation for Proper 22 – October 4, 2020

You are only as good as your last performance. So we are taught to think by a world whose motto often seems to be, “What have you done for me LATELY?”

Our society presents itself as extremely laid-back, accepting of virtually anything. In many ways, it is. Still, it tends to take a dim view when others do not do all they can to express themselves . . . in ways that society finds acceptable, that is. Society goes so far as to tell people to engage in such self-expression not to please anyone else, but strictly for themselves.

This can become a crushing burden. You must fashion an identity for yourself. Make sure it is genuine, not something you are merely copying from someone. Then at all times live it, and live up to it.

In the end, this kind of project takes people nowhere. Really, no one can rest with saying, “I don’t care what anyone else thinks.” For you really do care.

What we all need is an approving word from outside ourselves, from someone who loves us. We need an approving word from One Whose judgment upon us matters supremely, regardless of any failings of ours or any feelings of others.

In a Bible passage to be read at our church this Sunday, St. Paul wrote that “whatever gain I had, I counted as loss for the sake of Christ. Indeed, I count everything as loss because of

the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord.” Paul wanted to be “found in Him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God that depends on faith” (Philippians 3:7-9).

A book title said it all: not “self-esteem” but “Christ-esteem”!

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Sermon *"Any Means to Attain the Resurrection from the Dead" Philippians 3:4b-14*

Introduction:

We say that there is nothing more certain in life than death and taxes. Well there is. The resurrection of all the dead will most certainly take place. Everyone who has died from Adam and Eve till now, except for Enoch and Elijah who did not die but were taken straight up to heaven physically, will most certainly be raised from the dead. And if Christ doesn't return in our life time, we, too, we will die and rise again. This is most certainly true.

So, what makes us, Christians, so eager for this day?

I. Is it by confidence in the flesh?

Is it that we have been such good Christians? We are in church. We are hearing the Word of God? Those not able to be here with us are listening to the video we put out on Facebook or other Christian broadcasts. They may even be studying the message we post on Facebook.

We have been baptized. Many of us attended Sunday School, parochial school, midweek or Saturday School, have been confirmed, have routinely received Christ's body and blood in the Sacrament of the Altar. We have been good people. We have been good to others. And when we haven't, we have repented and asked for God's forgiveness.

Many have served the church by being on boards and committees, participated in Bible studies and service groups. We have shared our talents, our time and our treasures. We have been humble in doing all these things.

Yet, we do not put our trust in these things when we ponder standing before our heavenly Father on the day of the resurrection of all flesh. We do not mention them. We treat all this as nothing. In fact, we treat them as rubbish, something to be thrown away because they are of no use to us when it comes to standing before the Judge on the day of the resurrection of all flesh.

II. Or is it Christ Who has made us His own.

Our confidence and joy in looking forward to resurrection of all flesh lies in Christ and what He has done. It is His resurrection from the dead that makes it possible for us to rise from the dead.

It is because He has made us His own that give us the assurance that we will rise to life everlasting. He has made us children of God by giving us the Holy Spirit, creating faith in our hearts, forgiving us our sins and cleansing us of all unrighteousness.

This gift becomes so precious to us that we would do anything to attain to the resurrection of the dead. If it were up to us we would sacrifice all that we have, serve everyone in sight, worship our Lord daily and obey every command that He gave. We would work diligently to make this gift our own.

Paul says that he would strive for perfection for that is what is required of all who stand before the Father on the last day. He is confident that he will stand before the Father perfect and holy. But he points out that this confidence does mean he is already perfect and holy. It is something he strives for and has not attained. But, he is confident that he will be perfect and holy on the day he rises from the dead. Not because of what he accomplished, but what Christ has done for him and for us all.

It is why you and I can be confident about the day of the resurrection of all flesh. It is a glorious day for us and for all fellow believers in Christ. It is a day we need not worry about as we keep our eyes on Christ who is our resurrection and our life.

Conclusion:

Yes, taxes and death are for certain. So more certain is the day of the resurrection of all flesh. God grant us a continued confidence in His Son's resurrection that we may always find peace and hope in the resurrection of the dead and life everlasting.
