As We Gather

The images Jesus uses as He proclaims the kingdom of God often come from the world of agriculture. His parables are filled with plants and trees and birds and animals. Grapes, grapevines, and vineyards are all used as illustrations by Jesus as He teaches the people who are His first hearers and us also. As people who have been grafted as branches into Christ the Vine through Holy Baptism, we seek ways to strengthen that connection as the Holy Spirit works in and through us. We now nourish our faith as branches in Christ's vineyard as we grow in Him by Word and Sacrament.

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Sermon "Abide Within Us" John 15:1–8

Introduction:

Last week we heard in the Gospel reading Jesus say, "I know My Sheep." He knows each and everyone us personally. And today's Gospel reading records how important this personal relationship with Christ is for each and every one of us.

I. He in us

We are talking about a deep personal relationship, not an acquaintance, not just a friend or relative. The closest earthly example on earth is the union between a husband and a wife. As Scriptures describes this relationship as two becoming one. And even this fails due to the damage sin has caused in marital relationships.

Christ uses the word, abide. It is to dwell and remain in something. Jesus lives within us. He has chosen us, His disciples, to make us His home, His abode. This is how personal our relationship is with Christ.

He dwells in heaven with all its glory. He dwells in us, a shabby worn out structure that should be condemned and torn down. Flames should be put to this structure for there is nothing good that dwells within it.

Yet, this is the place He chooses to dwell and by doing so, we become His temple, a beautiful structure that He is proud to declare as His abode. This is what it means to have Christ dwell in us.

II. We in Him

And in return, or better as a result of Him dwelling in us, we dwell in Him. Here Christ uses the illustration of a vine and its branches. As the word abide refers to a shelter, abiding or remaining in a vine as a branch does means life. Apart from the vine the branch dies. Remaining attached to the vine means the branch is still alive and can produce fruit. This is how we know that the branch is still alive.

So, it is with us. Without Christ, we die. We are not able to produce fruit, in this case, good works, peace, joy, love and comfort. Anything we attempt is seen as being dead, dead leaves, no blossoms, and no fruit. It is a dead branch in the sight of God and is thrown away.

But with Christ dwelling in us, we are live. And this is shown by the fruit we produce, or better still what the vine, Christ, is able to produce through us. He is able to produce good works through us. He is able to comfort us, create peace within our hearts, move us to love one another and love Him, and to have joy in remaining in Him.

Conclusion:

The importance of Christ in us and us in Christ is that this is our salvation. This is how Christ brings His grace and forgiveness into our hearts and into our lives. The action of eating and drinking Christ's body and blood in and with and under the bread and wine is to show us that He truly does abide in us. And by being baptized in His name, we abide in Him.

The greatest danger, more deadly than war, pestilence, plague or violence, is to be separated from our Savior. Whatever this old world can find to tempt us to separate ourselves from Christ and tempt us to go it alone, it will throw at us. This old sinful flesh will tempt us to disregard the Word of God and the Sacrament and slowly cut us off from the life giving grace of God that comes pouring through these means of grace. And Satan will whisper in our ears that Christ would never abide in such a person as you and me.

But Jesus has declared that He desires to live in us and that we are to live in Him. He will keep us attached as a vine nourishes the branches and keeps them alive. He will continue to strengthen us in our faith in Him to remain attached to Him and to bear much fruit as proof we are His disciples.


