For younger children

Here is an exercise for children beginning to read. Pick a word or name, for example: “Hope” of “Christ,” since the theme today is “Our Hope in God.” If you save a copy for them and if they know how to underline using the underlining command, they can do it on the computer. They can also use the highlight function. Otherwise let them use a printed version of the worship folder. Let them draw and color buildings, people and other pictures in the margins of the service folder.

5th & 6th graders can mark the service with directional arrows which indicate the direction of the activity during the worship service. This was discussed in class. They can label the different parts of the service. They also are familiar with the questions throughout the service folder.

For older children especially those who are in or have in the past studied Luther’s Small Catechism

Here is an exercise that will strengthen their understandings of the teachings of the Bible. Have them mark, underline and/or identify where in the Catechism these teachings are found. For example: Where the resurrection of Jesus Christ is mentioned, one would mark it with the “2nd Article.” Or where the forgiveness of sin is mentioned, one would mark it with “3rd Article.” They can call me anytime if they have questions.

If any of this can be done from a copy on a computer, they can send it to me attached to an Email.

Adults/parents

You may find this helpful to do the above also, even the drawing and coloring.

For the youngest of your children, draw a cross or a lamb, if your talent so allows, anywhere in the Divine Service and let your little ones color them.

As We Gather

During these great fifty days of Easter, we gather again to hear the risen Lord Jesus as He appears and speaks to us in no less a real way than when He appeared and spoke to the first disciples before His ascension into heaven. As Scripture says, “The Lord is in His holy temple; let all the earth keep silence before Him” (Habakkuk 2:20). So we gather in reverent, holy anticipation as we hear the words of Jesus in John’s inspired account, recalling His promise given on Holy Thursday, His word concerning the promise that He would send “another Helper, to be with you forever, even the Spirit of truth” (John 14:16–17). The Holy Spirit is wherever He creates and sustains faith through God’s Word. However, our Easter celebration will break forth before the world on the Day of Pentecost.



Jesus says the world cannot receive, see, or know the Spirit. Paul found this to be true in Athens as he noticed an altar dedicated “To the unknown god.” Though many in our day certainly have heard about Jesus, they do not know Him apart from faith in His word. But you know Him! Baptized into Christ, His resurrection life has given us new life, which for now is but the beginning to be stretched out into life eternal.

First Reading Acts 17:16–31

¹⁶Now while Paul was waiting for them at Athens, his spirit was provoked within him as he saw that the city was full of idols. ¹⁷So he reasoned in the synagogue with the Jews and the devout persons, and in the marketplace every day with those who happened to be there. ¹⁸Some of the Epicurean and Stoic philosophers also conversed with him. And some said, “What does this babbler wish to say?” Others said, “He seems to be a preacher of foreign divinities”—because he was preaching Jesus and the resurrection. ¹⁹And they took hold of him and brought him to the Areopagus, saying, “May we know what this new teaching is that you are presenting?” ²⁰For you bring some strange things to our ears. Yet he is actually not far from each one of us, ²⁸for “‘In him we live and move and have our being’; as even some of your own poets have said, “‘For we are indeed his offspring.’” ²⁹Being then God’s offspring, we ought not to think that the divine being is like gold or silver or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of man. ³⁰The times of ignorance God overlooked, but now he commands all people everywhere to repent, ³¹because he has fixed a day on which he will judge the world in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed; and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead.”

Epistle *1 Peter 3:13–22*

¹³Now who is there to harm you if you are zealous for what is good? ¹⁴But even if you should suffer for righteousness' sake, you will be blessed. Have no fear of them, nor be troubled, ¹⁵but in your hearts regard Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; ¹⁶yet do it with gentleness and respect, having a good conscience, so that, when you are slandered, those who revile your good behavior in Christ may be put to shame. ¹⁷For it is better to suffer for doing good, if that should be God's will, than for doing evil. ¹⁸For Christ also suffered once for sins, the righteous for the unrighteous, that he might bring us to God, being put to death in the flesh but made alive in the

Sermon *Based on 1 Peter 3:13–22*

Title:
“This Hope Within Us”

Introduction:

We have heard that God is with us. It is our hope. It is our peace and assurance in uncertain times. Yet, what is this hope we so dearly cling to in these days?

Is it a hope in God to restore our lives back to the way they were before COVID-19? Is it a hope that our communities will experience prosperity, wealth and wellbeing? Is it a hope that things will be normal once again?

We may pray and hope this is true. Yet, this is a hope that can be shattered. If God wills that we have a new normal in life, if God wills that we experience for an extended time sickness, poverty or economic depression, if God wills that our lives will be changed forever, will we lose hope? I pray not.

I. It is established within our hearts

God has established within us a deeper hope, an everlasting hope that is not based on temporal blessings or conditions. It is a hope that is ours now and will be till the day Christ returns.

This hope that God has established within us is a hope based on Christ’s death and resurrection. It is hope that assures us that our sins are paid for and forgiven by God. Jesus has paid the price. He suffered and died once for all sin, the righteous for the unrighteous. He has risen so that we will rise to everlasting life in heaven. This is the hope that is within us. It is a hope that will be challenged by the world.

Take for instance the hope God has planted within our hearts through baptism. We know and believe that Christ has united us to His death and resurrection through Baptism. Scripture is clear on this. We can read it for ourselves in Romans 6. Our text for today’s message clearly states Baptism now saves you. This means God washed away our sin and made a promise with us that He will continue to forgive us our sin keeping us in the one true faith till life everlasting.

The world will press hard against this. It can even come from within the body of believers, especially those who reject infant baptism. They say it is wrong to trust in man’s actions. This is true. They say we are to trust in God the Holy Spirit do His work within us. This is true. They say to believe baptism is a saving act is superstition. They are deadly wrong.

Baptism is not an action of man. Man is helpless. He cannot save Himself. But God can. Baptism is like the waters of the flood lifting the ark with eight in it to safety. And through the water with the Word, God can and does lift us up to safety. He washes away our sins and brings us into His Church. This Church is the ark that is lifted up above the evil of this world and our

own sinfulness.

II. It is to be defended

We are fearful of what our families, friends and society will think of us if we cling to the truths contained in Baptism. Our own personal desires, emotions and feelings attack this truth. The world tempts us to believe that our baptism was of no use. It didn't work. There are better ways to know God's grace than in an act commanded by God.

Many having been taught the truth about Baptism have rejected this precious gift. They seek friendships and will not risk losing friends by defending what God the Holy Spirit has revealed to us about Baptism. They will see others misuse their Baptism as a "free-get-out-of-jail" card to continue in their sinful ways. They will in response listen to the voices that say, "See baptism doesn't work. Join us in knowing the promises of God are yours by what you feel." They may not reject that one needs to be baptized. They just don't see God's power and grace working in through the Word and the water.

Others will diminish the importance of Baptism so that they can fellowship with others that provide more lively music, more programs and appear more dedicated to the Lord. This they do not knowing they are actually rejecting the One who died and rose again for them. Now thanks be to God the Holy Spirit who can continue to work faith in the hearts of the hearing even when they misunderstand the nature of God's Work in and through Baptism.

All of God's truths are to be defended. This is because all truths are based on the hope that Jesus is Lord and Christ. It is for our assurance that He makes it clear to us that Jesus is sitting at the right of God. He is King and has authority over all, even His beloved Church, the body of believers. This is a certainty. And this is the hope God has established within our hearts.

Conclusion:

This hope that is within us does help us see past the evil and difficulties of the day. Sickness, war and political evils are but a fleeting moment. Christ is our everlasting King. We live in His everlasting kingdom. This is the hope that we know that we will get through these days to a better day in Christ.

God grant and keep this hope deeply planted in our heart. And may He give us lips to offer up our defense in what we believe with gentleness and respect.

Ask the Holy Spirit to create a clean heart in you and then prepare that heart by setting it aside, consecrating it for Jesus Christ as your Lord. Spend time in prayer asking for God to prepare you to share the hope that you have in Christ. And then look out, because God will answer that prayer with people and opportunities. So be bold. Be ready. Be prepared. In this hope, you have the forgiveness of your sin, your future secured, and your love unconditionally realized: Because He lives, you live!

Money Is a Test

Jesus said, "*So if you have not been trustworthy in handling worldly wealth, who will trust you with true riches?*" (Luke 16:11). John 14:15 – "**If you love me, you will keep my commandments.**" Jesus is clear: our obedience to His Word comes from our love for Him. But where does that love come from?



Jesus tells us that as well, “She was forgiven much, so she loved much” (Luke 7:47). Christ shows us His love and gives us the forgiveness of our sins – and this causes love to well up in us, which in turn causes us to keep the commandments of Jesus. For after all, the summary of the Law is “Love.”

Prayer: Dear Lord, help me to develop a right and proper attitude toward the money You have entrusted to me. Help me to see my money as a tool to help others. In Christ’s name I pray. Amen.

► **Without Flesh: Why the Church Is Dying Even Though Jesus Is Still Alive**

Have the times really changed? Is the Church actually dying? Are we truly in danger of being subsumed beneath a new, ominous culture of evil? Or is the only real difference a matter of our perspective? Is the only real change the fact that we have convinced ourselves that times have changed?

It is no secret that Christianity has been ceding ground to secular worldliness and exotic spiritualities for years. The front lines of the battle waged against the present darkness have experienced retreat after retreat, each time wagging heads saying, “If only we can rethink our strategies for mission, we can turn this tide and win the lost for Jesus.”

But for all our “rethinking,” we haven’t “rethought” nearly so much as it might seem. Perhaps, the real out-of-the-box thinking we need is not out-of-the-box at all, but inside it.

In *Without Flesh*, author Jonathan Fisk proposes that it isn’t that we need something new, but something we lost, something very, very old. Like . . .the most important words Jesus ever said. Fisk’s solution is simpler than we may think. Maybe the only problem is that we just don’t want to believe that it’s true.

“*Do this,*” He said.
