Living among the Bible's Trees: Tree of the Lord's Planting

Lenten Midweek 5 March 25, 2020

As We Gather

The trees of the Bible help us realize why we need a Savior, how God provided a Savior for us in the person of Jesus Christ, and how the saved lives of repentant believers look. Today we consider how God brings low the haughty and raises up the humble and repentant. Our Lord Jesus is like a sprig from the top of a cedar, "planted" by God (and risen) to become a new, glorious tree. Though those who rely on Him are seemingly insignificant, like a mustard seed, they grow as the Church to give shelter to all people who flock to our Lord and His gracious mercy.

Passion

The Crowd Chooses Barabbas

15 Now at the feast the governor was accustomed to release for the crowd any one prisoner whom they wanted. 16 And they had then a notorious prisoner called Barabbas. 17 So when they had gathered, Pilate said to them, "Whom do you want me to release for you: Barabbas, or Jesus who is called Christ?" 18 For he knew that it was out of envy that they had delivered him up. 19 Besides, while he was sitting on the judgment seat, his wife sent word to him, "Have nothing to do with that righteous man, for I have suffered much because of him today in a dream." 20 Now the chief priests and the elders persuaded the crowd to ask for Barabbas and destroy Jesus. 21 The governor again said to them, "Which of the two do you want me to release for you?" And they said, "Barabbas." 22 Pilate said to them, "Then what shall I do with Jesus who is called Christ?" They all said, "Let him be crucified!" 23 And he said, "Why? What evil has he done?" But they shouted all the more, "Let him be crucified!"

Pilate Delivers Jesus to Be Crucified

²⁴ So when Pilate saw that he was gaining nothing, but rather that a riot was beginning, he took water and washed his hands before the crowd, saying, "I am innocent of this man's blood; ^[b] see to it yourselves." ²⁵ And all the people answered, "His blood be on us and on our children!" ²⁶ Then he released for them Barabbas, and having scourged ^[c] Jesus, delivered him to be crucified.

Jesus Is Mocked

²⁷ Then the soldiers of the governor took Jesus into the governor's headquarters, ^[d] and they gathered the whole battalion ^[e] before him. ²⁸ And they stripped him and put a scarlet robe on him, ²⁹ and twisting together a crown of thorns, they put it on his head and put a reed in his right hand. And kneeling before him, they mocked him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" ³⁰ And they spit on him and took the reed and struck him on the head. ³¹ And when they had mocked him, they stripped him of the robe and put his own clothes on him and led him away to crucify him.

The Crucifixion

³² As they went out, they found a man of Cyrene, Simon by name. They compelled this man to carry his cross. ³³ And when they came to a place called Golgotha (which means Place of a Skull), ³⁴ they offered him wine to drink, mixed with gall, but when he tasted it, he would not drink it. ³⁵ And when they had crucified him, they divided his garments among them by casting lots. ³⁶ Then they sat down and kept watch over him there. ³⁷ And over his head they put the charge against him, which read, "This is Jesus, the King of the Jews." ³⁸ Then two robbers were crucified with him, one on the right and one on the left. ³⁹ And those who passed by derided him,

wagging their heads ⁴⁰ and saying, "You who would destroy the temple and rebuild it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross." ⁴¹ So also the chief priests, with the scribes and elders, mocked him, saying, ⁴² "He saved others; he cannot save himself. He is the King of Israel; let him come down now from the cross, and we will believe in him. ⁴³ He trusts in God; let God deliver him now, if he desires him. For he said, 'I am the Son of God." ⁴⁴ And the robbers who were crucified with him also reviled him in the same way.

First Reading Ezekiel 17:1–24

The word of the Lord came to me: [2] "Son of man, propound a riddle, and speak a parable to the house of Israel; [3] say, Thus says the Lord God: A great eagle with great wings and long pinions, rich in plumage of many colors, came to Lebanon and took the top of the cedar. [4] He broke off the topmost of its young twigs and carried it to a land of trade and set it in a city of merchants. [5] Then he took of the seed of the land and planted it in fertile soil. He placed it beside abundant waters. He set it like a willow twig, [6] and it sprouted and became a low spreading vine, and its branches turned toward him, and its roots remained where it stood. So it became a vine and produced branches and put out boughs.

- [7] "And there was another great eagle with great wings and much plumage, and behold, this vine bent its roots toward him and shot forth its branches toward him from the bed where it was planted, that he might water it. [8] It had been planted on good soil by abundant waters, that it might produce branches and bear fruit and become a noble vine.
- [9] "Say, Thus says the Lord God: Will it thrive? Will he not pull up its roots and cut off its fruit, so that it withers, so that all its fresh sprouting leaves wither? It will not take a strong arm or many people to pull it from its roots. [10] Behold, it is planted; will it thrive? Will it not utterly wither when the east wind strikes it—wither away on the bed where it sprouted?"
- [11] Then the word of the Lord came to me: [12] "Say now to the rebellious house, Do you not know what these things mean? Tell them, behold, the king of Babylon came to Jerusalem, and took her king and her princes and brought them to him to Babylon. [13] And he took one of the royal offspring and made a covenant with him, putting him under oath (the chief men of the land he had taken away), [14] that the kingdom might be humble and not lift itself up, and keep his covenant that it might stand. [15] But he rebelled against him by sending his ambassadors to Egypt, that they might give him horses and a large army. Will he thrive? Can one escape who does such things? Can he break the covenant and yet escape?
- [16] "As I live, declares the Lord God, surely in the place where the king dwells who made him king, whose oath he despised, and whose covenant with him he broke, in

Babylon he shall die. [17] Pharaoh with his mighty army and great company will not help him in war, when mounds are cast up and siege walls built to cut off many lives. [18] He despised the oath in breaking the covenant, and behold, he gave his hand and did all these things; he shall not escape. [19] Therefore thus says the Lord God: As I live, surely it is my oath that he despised, and my covenant that he broke. I will return it upon his head. [20] I will spread my net over him, and he shall be taken in my snare, and I will bring him to Babylon and enter into judgment with him there for the treachery he has committed against me. [21] And all the pick of his troops shall fall by the sword, and the survivors shall be scattered to every wind, and you shall know that I am the Lord; I have spoken."

[22] Thus says the Lord God: "I myself will take a sprig from the lofty top of the cedar and will set it out. I will break off from the topmost of its young twigs a tender one, and I myself will plant it on a high and lofty mountain. [23] On the mountain height of Israel will I plant it, that it may bear branches and produce fruit and become a noble cedar. And under it will dwell every kind of bird; in the shade of its branches birds of every sort will nest. [24] And all the trees of the field shall know that I am the Lord; I bring low the high tree, and make high the low tree, dry up the green tree, and make the dry tree flourish. I am the Lord; I have spoken, and I will do it."

Sermon "From Humble Beginnings"

We have trees in our yard that started out as saplings. Three pine trees survived and a couple of sugar maples. All are now huge and provides us with shade.

But there is one little sapling that is dear to my family's heart, that would be, the little tree that we planted a year before we moved here. Our older three children still look for that tree every time they drive past St. John's Lutheran Church (Ash Grove), Onarga, Illinois. They look to see if it is still there and how big it has grown.

Have you noticed how big the kingdom of God is? Considering how small it was? It started out no bigger than a mustard seed. But it has grown large like a mustard plant, large enough for birds to build their nest on its branches. It is large enough and strong enough for a bird to safely raise a family and to return again year after year.

This kingdom of God, that is, the reign of Christ, has grown from a small insignificant country of Israel. She was among the smallest of nations. She wasn't a large empire like the Babylonian, Persian-Mede, Greek, and Roman empires. She actually was bounced around like a seed in the hand of the planter. There is nothing about Israel to impress the world or would indicate that from Her would come a King whose reign would cover the world.

This King had a humble start, too. He was born of a virgin, laid in a manger and raised in carpenter's home. Nothing indicated that He would become the King of kings, and Lord of lords. Even His first group of followers consisted of twelve men, mostly fishermen, not soldiers or fighting men. This small tag of men could not have taken on the local Roman battalion let alone overthrow the empire. They were the smallest of armies and their leader a humble servant.

Yet, Christ established His kingdom through these followers. It was not by force and military might. It was by His sword, the Word of God with its two edges. The Law of God that put to death the sin within the heart of the hearer. The Gospel of Jesus Christ which created faith in the heart to believe Jesus to be the Savior of the world.

This sword went forth and now is conquering the world. It has grown large, large enough for people to find hope and rest. The branches of this kingdom are strong and large. It is able to provide a safe place for a family to gather and find refuge. It is able to provide protection year after year. It is able to reach out and cast a shadow over the entire world.

The message of salvation, the forgiveness of sin through Jesus Christ has caused the kingdom of God to grow. It continues to grow even though some of the branches are now missing and small twigs have fallen off. The kingdom of Christ continues to grow even though many have fallen away. It remains strong and sturdy.

We live in the kingdom of Christ. Here is where we find hope and peace. The world may falter and even fade away. But the Kingdom of Christ remains strong and will last forever. No disease, war, famine, natural disaster or Satan can overcome this Kingdom. It is ours forever.

So, stop and look at this mustard plant that has grown into a tree. Recall how small it was and how big it is now. Be at peace. The Kingdom of Christ is large enough to give refuge to all.


